Congratulations to Netherhall School's Deputy Headteacher Mr Mark Bailey, who was presented with his Silver Award for Teacher of the Year in a Secondary School at a presentation ceremony held at The National Gallery in Trafalgar Square, London on Friday, 24<sup>th</sup> September.

Travelling to London at 7am on Friday morning following our fantastic Open Evening for Year 6 students last Thursday night, Mr Bailey took the opportunity to visit some of the capital's top attractions, visiting Westminster Abbey before enjoying a guided tour of the Houses of Parliament, which was kindly sponsored by his local MP for Penrith and the Border, Dr Neil Hudson. Following this, Mr Bailey enjoyed a walk around central London, taking in St James' Park, Buckingham Palace, The Mall and a walk around Mayfair before arriving at The National Gallery for the celebration afternoon tea that was held for all Silver Award Winners.

Mr Bailey now goes forward to the Pearson National Teaching Award Final on Sunday, 28<sup>th</sup> November at The Brewery in London for the prestigious Gold Award and title of Teacher of the Year in a Secondary School, where he is one of only thirteen finalists in this category. # Poet Mike Garry pays a visit to Netherhall

Popular Mancunian performance poet Mike Garry took time out of his busy schedule to pay a visit to Netherhall School on Monday, 18<sup>th</sup> October.

A librarian for fifteen years prior to becoming a poet, Mike spends a lot of his time in schools sharing his infectious enthusiasm for poetry and instilling a love of reading in children across the country. He readily confesses that reading was his "way out" and is passionate about bringing live poetry to places it wouldn't normally reach, including prisons, young offender units, mental health hospitals, children's homes and even local pubs. Mike's work focuses on the city and its people, championing the underdog and finding beauty amongst the ugliness, triumph amongst tragedy.

In recent years, Mike has toured with fellow poet John Cooper Clarke performing in over 500 venues throughout the UK, US and Europe. His recent musical collaborations include working with New Order and performing with Iggy Pop, Patti Smith and the National in New York's Carnegie Hall for the Tibet House Charity. His Ode to Tony Wilson, 'St. Anthony' was Number one in three official UK Charts in August 2015 and the video was viewed by over a million people in its first month of release. An exstudent of the Manchester Metropolitan University receiving a BA (Hons) in Library and Information Studies, Mike still does regular talks to students on the course, the creative writing course and with trainee teachers.

Mike spent the whole day at the school with over a third of the school population involved in his thoroughly engaging poetry workshops throughout the day. Students from years 7, 8, 9 and 11 all got the opportunity to spend time with Mike in the library, discussing exactly why poetry matters and what place it has in today's world. 
# Netherhall bookworms aim for '10 in 10'

I've selected my favourites from each recommended reading list below:


#### Year 7: The Boy at the Back of the Class by Onjali Q. Rauf



This is the story about how one ordinary nine-year-old child and three classmates are full of empathy for Ahmet, a boy that comes to their school as a refugee from Syria (he is the boy at the back of the class). Through their sensitivity, curiosity, ingenuity, bravery and innocent niceness, they make a massive impact on Ahmet's life, friends, class, school, community and wider world.

An inspiring and sweet tale that will help children think about what it is to be a good person whatever your circumstances, and challenge prejudice and push for fairness, whenever possible. This book should help children be the best they can be and realise the power of kindness.


#### Year 8: After the War: from Auschwitz to Ambleside by Tom Palmer



Master storyteller Tom Palmer returns with a deeply moving and beautifully told novel of friendship and belonging, inspired by the incredible true story of the Windermere Boys.


#### Year 9: My Swordhand is Singing by Marcus Sedgwick



Woodcutters Peter and his father Tomas arrive in the lonely village of Chust. Peter doesn't understand why his father carries a long wooden box around with him, or why he has dug a deep ditch around their hut. But he is increasingly aware of malevolence about the place. Menacing shadows, villagers missing and people murdered only to reappear. With the help of Sofia, a travelling gypsy, Peter sets out to conquer the evil threat to the village and uncover the secrets of his father's past. Set in the seventeenth century amid the bleakness of winter in Eastern Europe, and inspired by vampire folklore, this is a superbly crafted, dark and menacing tale.

A sense of hardship, bitter cold and fear Penetrates the text, resulting in a chilling page-turner.

All of the books selected offer an untold adventure, an escape from reality, and I am certain our students will relish the opportunity to dive into the texts and explore new worlds.

## Managing Medication Procedures - Important information for parents/carers



We recognise that from time to time students may require medication within the school day. However, we do have to adhere to guidelines to ensure the safety of our students.

With this in mind, we would like to point out some procedures that we must follow:

- Some students may need to take prescribed medicines during their time in school. This will usually only be for a short time period, e.g. to finish a course of antibiotics. Parents/guardians must come into school and arrange this with reception.
- Children should not be sent to school with their own medicine (prescribed or non-prescribed) as this poses a health and safety risk to other children.
- Staff will not administer non-prescribed medication i.e. paracetamol, unless there are exceptional circumstances and where there is specific prior written permission from a parent/guardian.
- If a child suffers regularly from frequent or acute pain parents should refer the matter to their child's GP.

Parents/guardians have the prime responsibility for their child's health and should provide the school with timely, complete information about their child's medical condition. If your child has a medical condition that we do not know about, please contact the school, your child's Head of Year or Mrs B Johnstone.

#### Voluntary and Compulsory Homework Club

#### **Voluntary Homework Club**

As you are aware, homework is an important part of your child's learning and it is imperative that it is completed fully and in a timely manner.

To support this, the school offers a Homework Club with IT access and teacher support to all students, 3-4pm each weeknight in room 705. If your child completes their homework before 4pm, then they are welcome to leave the Homework Club.

#### **Compulsory Homework Club**

When students accrue three behaviour points for homework issues in the same half term, they will need to attend Compulsory Homework Club.

You will receive a phone call to notify you that your daughter/son has received three or more behaviour points for homework issues, and when they will be required to attend the Homework Club.

Students required to attend the Compulsory Homewpork Club will be collected from their period 7 lesson and taken to the club

As a parent/guardian, you are able to view your child's homework, achievement and behaviour points, and more via Edulink.
